From 2011 to 2021, the region's increasingly diverse workforce grew significantly, with the Hispanic/Latino population alone rising nearly 50%. Meanwhile, statewide workforce challenges persist, including an aging labor pool and barriers facing court-involved individuals. As the labor market evolves, workforce 10:25 strategies must adapt to ensure equitable access to family-sustaining careers for all.
